The Board Announces Upcoming Virtual Public Forum on the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act

June 24 Virtual Forum to Examine the Past and Future of FISA

Washington, DC- The Privacy and Civil Liberties Oversight Board has announced an upcoming virtual public forum to examine the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, or FISA. The Board will consider the past and future of FISA in light of recent Department of Justice Inspector General reports on the law's use.

The virtual public forum will provide Board Members with a diverse range of viewpoints on the FISA process, the law's use for counterterrorism, challenges for privacy and civil liberties, and proposals for changes to the law.
